Course Description:

In this course, students explore the relationships between people, places, and environments across local, regional, national, and global levels, employing spatial and ecological perspectives. A key focus of the course is on the physical processes that influence patterns in the natural world, examining the features of major landforms, climates, and ecosystems, along with their interconnections.

Course Goals:

Students who successfully complete this course will demonstrate competency in the following general education core goals:

- **Critical thinking skills** Students will engage in creative and/or innovative thinking, and/or inquiry, analysis, evaluation, synthesis of information, organizing concepts, and constructing solutions.
- **Communication skills** Students will demonstrate effective written, oral, and visual communication.
- **Teamwork** Students will demonstrate the ability to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal and consider different points of view.
- **Social responsibility** Students will demonstrate intercultural competency and civic knowledge by engaging effectively in local, regional, national, and global communities.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- list the Earth's many different landforms and major bodies of water;
- describe the physical and cultural characteristics of different regions of the world;
- describe the many factors that affect the world's climate.

Course Requirements:

Critical Thinking Exercises

While there will be prompts for each unit, you only need to complete two critical thinking essays. These assignments will pose unique and creative questions and situations related to the region of each unit. You will be asked to write a 3-page paper answering the question. The critical thinking questions will vary per unit. For these papers, I ask for in-depth thinking and creativity. Additionally, remember proper citations and grammar are imperative.

Chapter Quizzes

At the end of each unit, students will complete a small quiz regarding information from the book and power points. These quizzes will likely contain multiple-choice and an essay question. Students will have one opportunity to take the quiz.

Map Quizzes

You will have two map quizzes. For each quiz, you will be responsible for understanding and locating the counties and capitals of the regions covered since the last assessment. You will also have map elements on your mid-term and final exams. These quizzes will only cover specific units and will NOT be cumulative.

Mid-Term

The mid-term exam will occur after Unit 6 and will include information from all units up to that point. The mid-term will include multiple-choice, fill-in-the-blank, short answer, essay questions, and a map element. You will only have one chance to take this test and it must be completed all at once.

Final Exam

The final exam will occur during finals week and will include information from units studied AFTER the mid-term. The Final exam will include multiple-choice, fill in the blank, short answer, essay questions, and a map element. You will only have one chance to take this test and it must be completed all at once.
