# **Course Description:**

This course is a general introduction to the study of language. It includes an overview of foundational principles of linguistic theory and structure and introduces some of the core areas of linguistics research: phonetics and phonology (the sound system), morphology (the structure of words), syntax (the structure of phrases and sentences), semantics (how words relate to meaning), pragmatics (how meanings are generally situational). We will also study the analytical methods that have been developed in these subfields and apply them to linguistic data.

# **Course Goals:**

Students who successfully complete this course will demonstrate competency in the following general education core goals:

- **Critical thinking skills** Students will engage in creative and/or innovative thinking, and/or inquiry, analysis, evaluation, synthesis of information, organizing concepts, and constructing solutions.
- **Communication skills** Students will demonstrate effective written, oral, and visual communication.
- **Teamwork** Students will demonstrate the ability to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal and consider different points of view.
- **Social responsibility** Students will demonstrate intercultural competency and civic knowledge by engaging effectively in local, regional, national, and global communities.

# **Student Learning Outcomes:**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

• apply competently the knowledge of phonetics and phonology (i) to carry out analysis of phonetic data and (ii) to derive sound patterns and to formulate phonological rules in languages;

- describe the nature of human language, its universality and diversity;
- perform basic linguistic analysis of language data to solve language and communication-related problems;
- apply basic concepts of linguistics in areas such as phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, and semantics;
- apply linguistic theories and concepts to explain how language is learned and generalize about the language pattern in social contexts;
- observe and discuss language phenomena from various perspectives.

#### **Course Requirements:**

### Quizzes

Periodic quizzes will assess comprehension of core concepts and assigned readings. Quizzes will consist of multiple-choice and short-answer questions. The lowest quiz score will be dropped.

### **Homework Assignments**

Five homework assignments will provide students with opportunities to apply analytical techniques to linguistic data.

#### Midterm Exam

The midterm will test material covered in the first half of the course, including phonetics, phonological patterns, and basic morphology. The exam will consist of transcription exercises, problem-solving tasks, and short essays.

#### **Final Exam**

The cumulative final exam will evaluate students' understanding of linguistic structures and analytical methods. Students will demonstrate their grasp of linguistic concepts and theories and their ability to apply them to linguistic data analysis. The exam format will include phonetic transcription, phonological analysis, morphological problem sets, problem-solving, labeling, short answer, and multiple-choice questions.

#### **Reflective Self-Assessment**

A short-written assignment requiring students to reflect on their learning progress and areas for improvement. This is due at the end of the term.
